[&]quot;Dairy Review" Week in will report Margin," or the dollars remaining per one hundred lbs. of milk after feed is paid for, based on data for a 65-pound herd in the latest "PA Dairy Industry Performance Scorecard.

- USDA announced the December 2020 Class III milk price at \$15.72 per hundredweight, down \$7.62 from November's price and \$3.64 below year ago levels. Class III prices averaged \$18.16 per cwt. in 2020, up \$1.20 from 2019's average price. The December Class IV price was announced at \$13.36 per cwt., up 6 cents from November but down \$3.34 from a year ago. The 2020 average Class IV price was \$13.49 per cwt., down \$2.96 from the 2019 average Class IV price. Class III milk futures prices for the first six months of 2021 jumped in the past week, with the average price up about \$1.50 to \$18.01 per cwt. from January - June 2021.
- According to the USDA Ag Prices report, the All-milk price for November was \$21.30, up 90 cents from October. Feed prices were also up, reaching a multi-year high and yielding a milk margin price under USDA's Dairy Margin Coverage Program of \$11.87 per cwt. The higher all-milk price balanced out the higher feed prices, still yielding the second highest margin in 2020. Higher feed prices and lower milk prices are expected to weigh on margins in December and into 2021, with potential payments under the program anticipated.

Government and Industry:

- The USDA announced that it will spend another \$1.5 billion on food products, including milk and dairy, to extend the Farmer to Families Food Box program. The department will begin awarding contracts by January 19 with deliveries expected to begin shortly thereafter and continue through April. This brings the total spent of the food boxes to more than \$5 billion in total, with about 20 percent of the first four rounds spent on dairy. Class III prices rallied with the recent announcement.
