- Three Central Valley, California dairy farms have reported positive cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in their herds. After cows from the affected farms began exhibiting HPAI-related symptoms from Aug. 23 to Aug. 25, samples from these sites were submitted to the California Animal Health and Food Safety (CAHFS) laboratories and the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL). The tests were confirmed positive on Aug. 30. Affected farms were placed under quarantine and sick cows have been separated and are being treated. Healthy cows are allowed to ship milk for pasteurization. Animal transportation continues to be tracked.
- No HPAI-related human cases have been confirmed in relation to the CA farms with positive cases. California's pasteurized milk supply and dairy foods remain safe for consumption. California's HPAI in poultry experience has allowed them to respond quickly to these recent positive cases, as well as take preventative measures to remain proactive.
- Over 190 herds, across 14 states have reported positive HPAI since March 2024. Pennsylvania still has not experienced a confirmed positive case of HPAI in dairy yet.
- State and Federal agencies, such as USDA, FDA, and CDC, urge dairy farmers, even in unaffected states, to implement biosecurity plans and onfarm protocols. Additionally, they encourage dairy farmers to limit cattle movement and off-farm visitors.

## Government/Industry:

- Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture encouraging is Pennsylvania dairy farms to enroll in the voluntary Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program. Enrolled farms will benefit by no longer being individually required to test cattle prior to movement. Testing will be performed at no cost to producers, and the Department or USDA will provide necessary sampling supplies after enrollment. - The Pennsylvania Department of Ag is also encouraging dairies to submit biosecurity plans for evaluation. Approved plans necessary for obtaining permits to move milk and dairy animals off a farm in the event that avian influenza has been detected on that farm. An approved plan also required for enrollment the Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program. Biosecurity plans and questions about the plans can be submitted by email to: AGBioplans@pa.gov.
