Week Review" of "Dairy in will report issue on current Margin," or the dollars remaining per one hundred lbs. of milk after feed is paid for, based on data for a 75-pound herd in the latest "PA Dairy Industry Performance Scorecard."

- The dairy price index on the latest Global Dairy Trade auction increased 1 percent to \$4,011 per metric ton, with a 2.2 percent and 0.9 percent increase in whole milk powder and skim milk powder, respectively, driving the overall increase. This is the third session-to-session increase in a row. Prices for both butter and cheese fell this week, decreasing 1.9 percent and 1.2 percent, respectively.
- A coalition of 77 food and agriculture organizations, including the U.S. Dairy Export Council (USDEC) and National Milk Producers Federation, sent a letter to the White House last week asking the Biden administration to address the issues with empty containers leaving US shores without being reloaded. Due to increased shipping demands, coupled with a shortage of dock workers and truck drivers, a record number of fully loaded containers are waiting for an offloading dock in western US seaports. Once unloaded, an estimated two thirds of those container ships will choose not to wait to be reloaded. This is limiting the US's ability to export product to other countries.

Government and Industry:

- The National FARM (Farmers Assuring Responsible Management) Program has released a stakeholder survey on its Animal Care Version 5.0 plans. This survey gives dairy farmers and industry stakeholders the opportunity to provide early input on topics, issues, and potential changes they would like considered for 5.0. - The Agricultural Energy Efficiency Rebate Program has up to \$100,000 available for agricultural producers through a rebate voucher program for projects focusing on energy efficiency on the farm. All projects must be approved by DEP in advance by submitting an application. Vouchers will be awarded on a first come, first serve basis. The Dairy Excellence Grant is a competitive grant program that offers a 50 percent match of up to \$5,000 to dairy farmers to make improvements that impact cow comfort, production and efficiency.
