*Each issue of "Dairy Week in Review" will report on current "Milk Margin," or the dollars remaining per one hundred lbs. of milk after feed is paid for, based on data for a 75-pound herd in the latest "PA Dairy Industry Performance Scorecard."

- Total cheese output, excluding cottage cheese, was up 4.4 percent from a year ago to 1.14 billion pounds in August, down 0.3 percent from July. American type cheeses were up 1.5 percent from last year while Italian type cheese production was up 8.8 percent. Butter production was down, falling 1.7 percent from a year ago and 1.5 percent from last month to 148 million pounds, according to the latest USDA Dairy Products Report.
- Higher cull cow prices and lower milk prices are moving more dairy cows to slaughter, with 60,700 dairy cows culled last week. The culling rate on the average dairy farm is 4.5 percent above a year ago. Dairy cow slaughter in August was up 2.3 percent from a year ago, while year-to-date levels are up 1 percent from 2020 levels.
- Nationally, 41 percent of the corn has been harvested, while the soybean harvest is 49 percent complete, both moving at a faster pace than last year. However, damp weather has delayed the harvest in Pennsylvania, according to the latest Crop Progress Report. Only about 23 percent of the corn for grain has been harvested in Pennsylvania, as of October 18, down from 32 percent last year at this time. About 18 percent of the soybeans have been harvested, down from 61 percent by this time last year. More than 90 percent of the corn for silage has been harvested in the state.
- The dairy price index rebounded on the latest Global Dairy Trade auction, increasing 2.2 percent to \$4,061 per metric ton. Butterfat prices were up 4.7 percent, while Cheddar prices were up 2.9 percent and whole milk powder and skim milk powder prices both rose, increasing 1.5 percent and 2.5 percent, respectively.
- Cheese and butter products were among the 160 categories of processed foods on a list the Food and Drug Administration released with new voluntary guidelines calling for significant reductions in sodium levels in processed foods. Industry groups encouraged FDA to exempt dairy products due to their nutritional value, but were unsuccessful in their ask.
