MAY: Inflation continues to pressure dairy sales at the retail level while cow numbers and milk production continue slight growth compared to last year. The spring flush is expected to peak this month with warmer summer weather expected to begin reducing milk production in the warmer climate states in June. Fluid milk orders are down with the school year rapidly coming to an end. Coupling the spring production surge with declining fluid sales is not a good mix to support strong milk prices. This pressure is reflected in current Class III and IV milk price futures. Class III and IV continued to decline through May.

As of May 22 CME closing prices, Class III and IV milk futures continued their recent trend of month-over-month decreases. For the first time in recent years, the 12-month average Class III price fell below the 5-year average price. Five months out of the next 12 months average \$1.40 below the 5-year average, and the other seven months average 64 cents per cwt over the 5-year average. The net effect is a 12-month average price of \$17.84 per cwt, which is 21 cents per cwt less than the 5-year average of \$18.05 per cwt. Compared to the end of April, the current average futures price is 85 cents per cwt less. Class IV has not declined as rapidly as Class III but did experience a slight 8-cent decline compared to April at \$18.74 per cwt. The 12-month average Class IV price continues to be higher than the 5-year average by \$1.44.

At 9.430 million cows, the U.S herd size increased year-over-year (YOY) by 26,000 (+0.3%) cows in April. However, the national herd size decreased month-over-month by 16,000 head versus March revised numbers primarily because of the catastrophic fire that decimated a large Texas dairy in April. U.S milk production increased a slight 0.3% to 19.210 billion pounds. This is 63 million pounds more than April 2022. The increase in milk production came primarily from increased YOY cow numbers with milk production per cow remaining flat at 2,037 (+0.05%) pounds/cow, just one pound/cow more than last year.

The April Pennsylvania dairy herd decreased by 1,000 (-0.2%) cows compared with last year to 466,000 cows. So far, through four months of the year, the Commonwealth has been able to maintain a constant

number of dairy cows. Despite a smaller herd, total milk production remained even with last year at 855 million pounds. This means that milk



cow efficiency increased this April compared to a year ago. The average Pennsylvania cow produced 1,869 pounds of milk or 39 (+2.1%) pounds more than she did in April 2022.

For the first time in 12 months, March dairy exports on a milk solids equivalent basis declined YOY, reported at 227,500 metric tons (MT) or about 910 MT less than March 2022. Record exports of nonfat dry milk/ skim milk powder to Mexico and record whey protein concentrate 80+ were not enough to offset declines in most other categories. The U.S Dairy Export Council (USDEC) expects the headwinds of international competition, inflation, economic uncertainty, and reduced Chinese demand to continue to hamper U.S. exports through at least the remainder of the first half of the year. Currently, increased European Union (EU) milk production is driving down dairy product prices and giving EU products a price advantage compared to U.S. dairy products. EU milk production is expected to decline after the first half of the year, which may provide the U.S. with more opportunities for exports. Export value decreased YOY for the second month in a row, valued at \$814.8 million, down 34.5 million (-4%) compared to March 2022
