August: Milk production has been relatively stagnant this year. June production was originally reported as having year-over-year (YOY) growth of about 33 million pounds (+0.2%). After revised milk production and cow numbers were released this month, June milk production shrank by 12 million pounds (-0.1%) because of a smaller herd size than what was originally reported last month. The herd size for June was reduced by 7,000 to 9.415 million cows. July milk production followed previous months' trend of neither growing nor shrinking much compared to one year ago.

July U.S. milk production as reported by the most recent USDA Milk Production report grew a slight 0.2% (+43 million pounds) YOY. The milk production increase was a result of increased milk production per cow as the number of cows across the nation declined to 9.416 million head (-0.7%) compared to last July. The national herd size was 1,000 head larger in July than the revised June herd size. Total milk production was reported as 19.140 billion pounds which is equal to 2,033 pounds per cow per month, 19 pounds per cow more than last July. The average U.S. cow produced 75.4 pounds of milk per day during July, 0.7 pounds more than she did last year.

Pennsylvania was able to maintain its herd size of 467,000 head for the fifth month in a row. Unfortunately, this is still 8,000 less (-1.7%) than last year. Milk production per cow increased YOY by 10 pounds (+0.6%) per cow to 1,810 pounds per cow during July. The average Keystone dairy cow produced 67.1 pounds of milk per day, 0.4 pounds more than during July 2021. This was not enough of an increase in productivity to overcome the reduction in herd size, resulting in a decrease in total production. Total milk production across the state was 845 million pounds in July, representing a total decline of 10 million pounds (-1.2%) compared to last July.

Class III and IV milk prices have stabilized some since this time last month. On Aug. 22, the 12-month average Class III price was \$20.05 per cwt, up 6 cents compared to July 21 closing prices. The average Class IV price fell 13 cents from last month at \$21.61. Domestic demand is being challenged by higher food prices, with retail data showing that families are still buying dairy products but are buying less volume to potentially be better able to afford the

ble increases were cheese (+31%), whey (+23%), lactose (+22%), and butter (+63%). Skim milk/nonfat dry milk (SMP/NDM) powders were the only major category to experience YOY declines, with exports of these products falling by 14%. However, according to the USDEC, this is a supply issue, not a demand issue. With milk production flat, there is not an adequate supply of milk available to make enough SMP/NDM to meet demand.
