CDE DAIRY MARKETS & MANAGEMENT UPDATE

JANUARY: January has been an active month for the dairy industry. The new U.S.-Japan trade agreement started on January 1st. Barring something unforeseen, the President will have signed the USMCA trade agreement by the time this article reaches you. Phase 1 of the new U.S.-China trade deal, which promises increased purchases of U.S. agricultural products, was also signed by the U.S. and Chinese Administrations. Domestic demand is relatively strong, and production is still growing at a rate slower than recent history. Initial numbers reported by the USDA show 2019 production was just 0.3% higher than 2018. The average rate of growth for the prior 10 years has been 1.5%, year over year. These factors have helped to increase the average milk price over the next 12 months compared to the end

Average Class III and IV milk futures prices are higher than this time last month. Class III is averaging \$17.90 per hundredweight, 37 cents higher than the end of December. Class IV is averaging \$17.94 for the next 12 months, 18 cents higher than December. Class III and IV milk futures prices inverse in May, and Class IV continues to trade higher than Class III for the rest of 2020. December U.S. milk production increased 0.67% over December

2018 driven by over a half pound increase in milk production per cow. Cow numbers were 9.339 million, a 0.15% drop compared to last December. However, cow numbers reached a 2019 low of 9.317 million in August and have increased month over month since then. Dairy cow slaughter was up 1.61% compared to December 2018. Pennsylvania milk production fell another 1.5% compared to De-

cember 2018, while cow numbers fell another 4.4% compared to last December. After holding at 485,000 head for five months, the

Pennsylvania herd decreased by 2,000 head in December, falling to 483,000. However, production per cow continued to increase compared to last year. Production per cow

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


per day increased 3%, resulting in an increase of 1.9 pounds per cow across all mature dairy cows.

November export value showed growth compared to December 2018, increasing 22.14% to over \$530 million. We will have to wait and see what happens to exports in 2020. Some of dairy product prices are becoming expensive relative to our main export competitors. This may put downward pressure on the volume of dairy products that we are able to move overseas.

The latest USDA Livestock, Dairy, and Poultry Outlook shows a mix of increases and decreases in dairy product prices for 2020. The USDA is forecasting an All Milk price of \$19.25. This estimate is 15 cents than what less

was published last month but is still 65 cents higher than the 2019 estimated All Milk price of Hopefully, \$18.60. the futures prices will continue to increase, and we will see estimates looking favorable for the rest of the year.
