CDE DAIRY MARKETS & MANAGEMENT UPDATE All prices – TUESDAY, AUG. 25, 2020 – except where noted

AUGUST: What a crazy year it has been so far! Volatility has been rough to deal with. April and May brought the lowest prices in over 10 years, followed by a record \$8.90 per cwt month-to-month increase in the June Class III price. Unfortunately, this was largely offset by record negative Producer Price Differentials (PPD) across the country. Negative PPDs are expected into the fall but should be less negative than June and July. Fortunately, volatility seems to have settled somewhat. Futures prices are now trading below pre-COVID-19 values for the rest of the year.

At the close of business Monday, August 24, the Class III milk futures price averaged \$16.69 per cwt for the next 12 months, \$1.51 per cwt lower than the end of July. The 12-month average Class IV price also fell, but not as drastically. Class IV averaged \$14.65 Monday, 26 cents per cwt less than this time last month. What has caused this recent drop in milk prices? While retail sales are still increasing year over year (YOY), food service sales are still lagging YOY. Milk production is back to positive YOY growth from May's decrease. We are back to a milk surplus, and that is putting downward pressure on milk prices.

July U.S. milk production increased 1.5%, YOY, to 18.645 billion pounds while dairy cow slaughter was down 9.0% to 233,700 head. The average U.S. lactating cow produced 73.9 pounds of milk in July, a 1.1% increase over July 2019. The national dairy herd has grown 0.4% since last July, increasing 36,000 head to 9.352 million. This is only 2,000 head more than last month but 33,000 head less than the March 2020 high of 9.385 million.

Pennsylvania's July milk production increased to 865 million pounds, a 4.0% increase YOY. The state's herd fell 0.6%, YOY, to 482,000 head—a 3,000-head drop from year ago, but is the same as last month. The average cow in Pennsylvania is now producing 66.5 pounds of milk per day, 2.9 pounds (4.6%) more compared to July a year ago.

June dairy exports continue to impress despite the current domestic market. According to the U.S. Dairy Export Council (USDEC), June export volume was up 29% and export value was up 22% compared to last year. U.S. suppli-

ers exported over 206,000 metric tons of dairy products to other countries in June, which represents 17.7% of national milk production on a solids basis, valued at almost \$584 million.

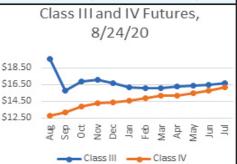
