OCTOBER: You can learn a lot from people or cultures different from your own. One of the things I miss most about dairy farming is the people I worked with. I learned a tremendous amount about Mexican culture from the Latino employees who worked for us over the years. As they assimilated into the U.S. culture, they would participate in our holidays and our way of life. However, they have their own cultural holidays they celebrate as well and would sometimes include me and my family in the festivities

Halloween reminds me of one those holiday differences. Perhaps those of you who are Catholic are familiar with All Saints' Day. I do not remember celebrating All Saints' Day in any of the churches I have attended, so I did not really know much about it until I began working with my Latino employees. From November 1 to 2, Día de Muertos is celebrated in Mexico and is similar to All Saints' Day. This translates to Day of the Dead in English. Although it sounds morbid, it is indicative of the closeness of the family structure in the Mexican culture. Día de Muertos is a chance to honor and celebrate the life of deceased loved ones and ancestors that came before them.

While Día de Muertos is not scary, something that can be unsettling for dairy farmers of all cultural backgrounds are the dairy markets. Volatility continues, but Class III milk prices continue to improve this month. The 12-month average Class III milk price is now \$18.15 per cwt, up \$1.19 from last month's \$16.96. Unfortunately, the Class IV market has dropped since last month. The 12-month average Class IV price is down \$0.27 per cwt to \$14.82.

September U.S. milk production was up 2.4% to 18.008 billion pounds compared to September 2019. The increased milk production was the result of an additional 33,000 head of cows coupled with a 1.5 pound per cow per day rise in milk production over last year. The U.S. dairy herd is now 9.366 million, and each cow averages 73.7 pounds of milk per day. Dairy cow slaughter this September was down 2.2% to 249,900 head compared to last year.

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
tember, the average Pennsylvania dairy cow produced 64.8 pounds of milk per day, an increase of 2.5% or 1.6 pounds per cow per day over last year. September was the fourth consecutive month the Commonwealth was able to maintain its herd size.

August exports continued to show year-over-year growth in volume and value and was the 12th month in a row that showed year-over-year growth. According to USDEC, U.S. suppliers shipped 190,435 tons of dairy products this past August, a record for the month. Export value was estimated to be \$538 million, nearly 11% more than August 2019. For the year, export volume is up 16% and value is up 14% compared to the same time-frame last year.

Many or perhaps most of the dairies in the U.S. have been present for mul-

tiple generations. With many communities across the country discouraging traditional Halloween festivities, maybe it would be a good year to make Día de Muertos a part of your Class III and IV Futures family culture.
